- 6. Write a sequel to the book that reveals how the characters mature.
- 7. Using symbols for the main idea and events of the story, draw a sequence map that reveals the most significant attributes.
- 8. Make a collage or mobile using symbols for the characters and events in the story that reveal the major ideas.
